Origami Paper Ornament

Instructions:

1. Cut paper of your choice into uniform and equal strips of paper.
2. Fold the paper lengthwise so it looks 2 cm wide and 8 cm long.
3. Fold corners on either side, where the bent longer side is the folded side (fold to make corner ends, but fold into the cut sides).
4. Fold the paper in half.
5. Do this for all 8 pieces of paper.
6. Use the pointed corners to tuck them into the slots on one of the prepared strips of paper.
7. Do this until you have joined them all together to make a wreath-shaped ornament.
8. You can use a small amount of glue to secure any loose pieces.
9. Cut a small hole at the top and fasten your string so it can hang on a tree, or another location of your choice.
10. You can keep this for multiple years in a box, or you can separate the string and the paper and recycle the paper.

Materials Needed

- 8 strips of paper 8 cm by 4 cm
- Glue
- String to hang it

Fast Fact:

Visual Instructions Origami Paper Ornament



1. Cut paper of your choice into uniform and equal strips of paper (4 cm x 8 cm).



2. Fold the paper lengthwise so it looks 2 cm wide and 8 cm long.

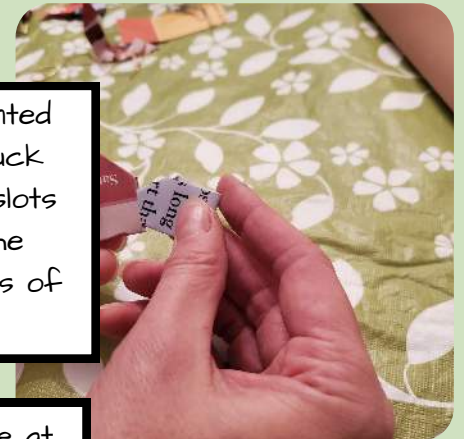


3. Fold corners on either side, where the bent longer side is the folded side (fold to make corner ends, but fold into the cut sides).



4. Fold the paper in half.
5. Do this for all 8 pieces of paper.

6. Use the pointed corners to tuck them into the slots on one of the prepared strips of paper.



7. Do this until you have joined them all together to make a wreath-shaped ornament.

8. You can use a small amount of glue to secure any loose pieces.



9. Cut a small hole at the top and fasten your string so it can hang on a tree, or another location of your choice.

10. You can keep this for multiple years in a box, or you can separate the string and the paper and recycle the paper.
